
Update from the Principal

Message for Year 9


Dear Year 9,

Year 11 have had another fantastic term! Students have continued to show a positive attitude towards their learning and their behaviour. I am proud of them all!


The Year 11 Leadership team have been set two challenges this term; to fundraise and for a local food bank and to make a changes in school to address the challenges of climate change.

Student Leadership – Spring Term

This term the Student Council team have been involved in a number of projects including; changes to the school lunch, evaluating the school planner, enhancing the school house system badges and planning Ramadan support for students and EID celebrations. They were also invited to take part in a 'Local Democracy Workshop' at Bradford City Hall, which included a tour of the magnificent courtroom, the Lord Mayor's office and Council Chamber. During the visit students met with Councillor Sue Duffy and had lunch with Lord Mayor, Martin Love.

Six student leaders were tasked as researchers for the 'Fix our Food' project. The students were asked to conduct research into Free School Meals (FSM) focused on the research question; 'Does the current allowance for free school meals allow young people to choose tasty, healthy and sustainable food at school?'

The first stage of the research project included working with six other schools and a team of researchers for an initial research day at York University. The day focused on: why FSMs are important; what healthy foods are; what sustainable food is and how the research project will be conducted.

The next stage involved the six students purchasing a lunch everyday for a week; the students had to select a lunch that is healthy and sustainable, but that they would also want to eat, all within the FSM budget. Each day they had to fill in research sheets and discuss options chosen relating back to the research question. The findings from the research will be gathered together and analysed. The hope is the 'Fix our Food' project can take the findings to parliament!

Our Year 11 Leaders have launched their two initiatives; 'Going Green' and 'Supporting our community'. Next term we will see the impact of these. Our Head Boy and Head Girl have also delivered whole school assemblies this term.

Values Champion

Values Champions were chosen for this term. Students are wearing their badges with pride, acting as student role models and enjoying the use of the 'queue jumping' in the canteen. Six students who consistently demonstrated our school values during the Residential were also awarded with Value Champion awards.

Well done to all.

Enrichment

This term's enrichment timetable has included: Reading and Homework club, Food Life Skills, Art club, Jiu-Jitsu, Mindfulness, British Sign Language, Archery, First Aid, Basketball and Girls football.

House System

Students have been involved in a number of house competitions for the Arts term including: World Book Day Treasure Hunt, Food Bank donation (lead by Year 11 student leaders) and the Best House represented at the Outward Bound Residential.

Currently Lister is taking the lead. Go LISTER!

Year 10 sports leaders also led on girls' football.

Careers

One In A Million Free School supports all students from Year 7 to Year 11 with their career pathways and post-16 options. Students have continued to be involved in a number of Career based activities:

- All Year 11 had their careers appointments with a Shine Careers advisor. They have also had support with next step destinations, applications, interview prep/tips and personal statements/CVs writing.
- 30 Year 10 students took part in a NHS workshop for the Nursing sector. The session involved nurses who helped the students to understand day-to-day life as a nurse and the students took part in an activity session.
- All students took part in National Careers Week. Our KS3 students acquired further knowledge about employability skills and various career pathways. They reflected on which skills they use around school and set targets on which skills to develop. Year 10 students began to explore post-16 options, researching which option would be best suited for their future career. Year 11 students developed their knowledge on their chosen career choice.

A Year 8 student's reflection of the session: *"I understand now that the skills we need for our jobs, we use in school all the time! Skills like being on time and problem solving are helping us prepare for when we are older."*

World Book Day

Students engaged in a range of activities to promote reading during Thursday 2nd March 2023 as part of texts and additional literacy for National World Book Day.

The activities included a treasure hunt, whole class reading of additional texts and fun and reading lessons for students in Years 7, 8 and 9. All these activities are part of a wider programme of events designed to boost literacy and develop a love of reading.

We encourage all our students to read for pleasure, so choosing the right book is crucial! Our school has a well-stocked library and staff are able to direct students to the most appropriate books to match their interests and reading levels.

Important Attendance Facts for Parent/Carers

Attendance of 90% is the equivalent of 19 days absent over the school year. On average those students who did not achieve grade 9 to 4 in English and Maths were found to have an attendance rating of 91.2%.

At One In A Million Free school we expect students to have Excellent Attendance, which is at least 97%. We understand that students fall unwell or have medical needs where attending school daily is not as achievable, however parent/carers must call school on the morning of any absence.

Tips For Excellent Attendance

Top Tips

- Talk to your child about the importance of going to school every day
- Take an interest in their school work, including helping with homework and attending parents/carers evenings. If they know it matters to you it will matter to them.
- Have set times for going to bed and waking up so your child gets plenty of sleep and is up in good time to get to school on time.
- Stop using electronic devices one hour before bedtime.
- Have clothes and school bag ready the night before.
- Only let your child stay home if they are genuinely ill.
- If your child doesn't want to go to school, find out why and work with your school and child to try to sort out the problem.
- Celebrate your child's achievements at school and their good attendance.
- Book doctor, dentist, and other appointments after school hours.
- Book holidays in the school holidays, not term time.
- If you need help, ask for it. Speak to your child's Head of Year

Holidays During Term Time

You can't take your child out of school during term time. If you do, you could receive a penalty notice.



Holidays During the School Term - The Law

Once your child is registered at One In A Million Free School, the law says you must send them to school every day and on time.




Penalty Notices and Fines

If you take your child out of school without permission, you may receive a penalty notice.

If you receive a penalty notice you will have to pay:

- £60 per parent for each child - if you pay within 21 days
- £120 per parent for each child - if you don't pay within 21 days, but do pay within 28 days.

If you don't pay, you will be taken to court.

E- Safety

At One In A Million Free School, we appreciate that E-Safety is an important part of keeping children safe. We have security measures in place at school, which are constantly monitored, to help safeguard students from any potential dangers. E- Safety is taught to all students explaining and demonstrating how to stay safe and behave appropriately online. However, One In A Million Free School can only be successful in keeping children safe online if we work with you as parent/carers to ensure the e-Safety message is consistent. Your help is needed to talk to your children about how they can keep safe and behave appropriately online.

Actions which you may wish to take to help safeguard your children online include:

- Install/use parental control software which allows you to limit sensitive information you don't want your child to access
- Make sure your browser is set to take advantage of built-in security and safety features - Look under "Tools," then "Internet Options."
- Turn on all the filtering and security features in your computer's search engine
- Set high security and privacy settings with browsers, memberships, and social networking sites.
- Install and maintain Internet security software on all devices.
- Always read app/site ratings before allowing your children to visit/download.
- Check your browser's history to see which sites your children are visiting and how often.
- Limit younger children's online chatting, even within the friendly interface of a favourite game or club site. As they get older, introduce the concept of chatting with people they know.
- Make sure the computer or device your child uses is within your view, in a public space like the kitchen or family room.
- Teach your children to tell a parent, teacher, or trusted adult if they feel uncomfortable about anything they've seen online.
- Always reinforce that your child needs to ask your permission before talking to anyone new online.
- Ask your child not to download files (e.g., music, games, screensavers, ring tones), make online purchases, or install software or apps without your permission.
- Talk about protecting private information and never sharing passwords with friends.



School Uniform

All our students in Year 7 to 11 are expected to wear the approved school uniform.

A high standard of work and behaviour is expected from all our students and we believe these are helped by also having high standards of appearance.

All items of school uniform are worn conventionally and we expect parents/carers to support our reasonable requirements. We operate uniform checks each morning to ensure our students uphold our high standards with regard to the dress code and to check on essential items for a successful school day. If the correct uniform isn't being worn, students will be asked to change into school owned alternatives or they may be sent home to change.

Non uniform coats, hoodies or footwear should be removed before students enter the building and stored in their locker.
